Population of Hualapai Tribe (2010)

Population: **1,335**

- Children ages birth to five years: **197**

Birth Characteristics of the Hualapai Tribe

- **28%** of mothers do not receive prenatal care in the first trimester of pregnancy
- **25%** of babies are born to mothers 14-19 years old
- **14%** babies are low birth weight

Child Health

- **76%** of two-year olds have the recommended vaccines for their age
- The number of children breastfed significantly decreased between 2010 and 2011
- **25%** of children 2-5 years old are categorized obese

Child Care

There is **1** regulated child care provider for the Hualapai Tribe, and **4** unregulated child care providers.

Child Care Capacity: **72**

- **80%** of young children have all parents in the workforce

Child Education

- **71%** of 3rd graders in the Hualapai Tribe do not pass the Reading AIMS
- **24%** of Arizona 3rd graders do not pass the Reading AIMS

The Hualapai Tribe values education and provides incentives for community members to pursue their education.

Food Assistance (2011)

Percentage of children ages birth to five years receiving SNAP: **62%**

Percentage of children ages birth to five years enrolled in WIC: **70%**

Foster Care

There has been a notable decrease in the number of children under age five in foster care.

In 2011, there were 34 substantiated cases of child abuse and neglect in the Hualapai Tribe.

Parent Education & Economics in the Hualapai Tribe (2010)

- **41%** of people in Arizona live in Poverty
- **45%** of children ages birth to five years in Arizona live in poverty

Unemployment in the Hualapai Tribe (2011): **25%**

Parent Education is correlated to child wellbeing.

- **61%** of women giving birth in the Hualapai Tribe do not have a high school diploma

Stakeholder Targets

- Support for teen parents
- Prevention and intervention of childhood obesity
- Improved communication between tribal and non-tribal agencies providing services in the region
- Additional behavioral health services for young children
