#### ***DRAFT Meeting Minutes***

On Monday, March 2, 2015 the White Mountain Apache Tribe Regional Partnership Council held a Regular Meeting beginning at 3:00 p.m. The meeting was at ABC Day Care, 422 South 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue, Whiteriver, Arizona 85941.

#### **Welcome/Introduction/Call to Order**

Chair Endfield called the meeting to order at 3:07p.m. She asked for a roll call of members. Members present were Chair Endfield, Michael Gaffney, Kathy Wynn, and on the phone Dawnafe Whitesinger, Shine Burnette and Jandi Craig. Members absent were Paula Hoyt and Nikina Whitaker. Chair Endfield asked members on the phone to identify their self when speaking and voting.

#### **Call to the Public**

No calls to the public were received.

#### **Disclosure of Conflicts**

No members disclosed conflicts.

#### **Discussion and Possible Approval of February 2, 2015 Meeting Minutes**

Chair Endfield asked for a motion for the February 2, 2015 meeting minutes. Member Gaffney moved to approve the February 2, 2015 Regular Meeting Minutes as presented. Member Wynn seconded. Motion passed.

Chair Endfield said that item 6c will be addressed out of order at this time so that the presenter, Mr. Greer, can return to after school bus duty.

#### **Expansion, Start-Up and/or Capital Expense**

Mr. Greer, Principle of Seven-Mile School provided an update of the progress of the expansion strategy. He said they are in the process of wrapping up expansion and are moving to be a Quality First Center. He said they have had their Quality First assessment and were given a 2 star rating. He is hoping that they will continue to improve and get a 3 star rating at the next assessment.

#### **Presentation, Discussion, and Approval of the Regional Council Governance Policy**

Regional Director Beazley said that First Things First General Counsel Casey Cullings has done an overhaul of the Regional Council Governance Policies to bring them up to date. She said that the Regional Council got a copy of the governance policy at the last meeting and directed making a couple of changes specific to the White Mountain Apache Tribe Regional Council. She asked if any members had other comments or changes they would like to make. If not this will serve as a second reading and the Regional Council can move to approve the updated governance policy. Member Wynn moved to approve adopting the Regional Governance Policy as updated by FTF General Counsel and including the following items specific to the White Mountain Apache Tribe RPC:

1. Chair and Vice Chair Elections will be held in June for the following fiscal year.
2. Meeting dates, times and locations will be set in June for the following fiscal year.

Member Gaffney seconded. Motion passed.

#### **White Mountain Apache Regional Program Updates**

##### **Family Support-Children with Special Needs**

Jan Biakeddy, Indian Health Service Public Health Nurse Director, told the Regional Council that Ms. Taylor was not able to come to the meeting, and that the other coach will present the report if he is able to finish up at the school.

##### **Oral Health Strategy**

Becky Baldwin, Navajo County Public Health Oral Health Educator reported that the program is up to date with their numbers and reporting. They now have 14 sites where they do the fluoride varnishes. She said that they will be attending the Head Start screenings and on Tuesday March 10th they will be doing a tele-dentistry demo in at Chaghache Tribal Day Care in Whiteriver.

### **Review and Discussion of the Regional Council Planning Calendar**

Regional Director Beazley gave the Regional Council a copy of her planning calendar that she uses to plan upcoming RPC meeting agendas, as well as ongoing and upcoming projects and events. She noted that of primary importance to the Regional Council are the upcoming meetings for April, May and June since important work around grant renewals and system building will require all members to be present to ensure that quorum will be maintained if there are conflicts of interest on certain agenda items for discussion or approval. She told the Regional Council that during July through November of this year she will be working with the Tribal Health Board and Tribal Council on getting the required permission to collect data for the upcoming update in 2015 of the Needs and Assets Report, as well as the in-depth Needs and Assets Report to be completed in SFY2017. She will be able to provide information to the RPC in April of the type of data that will be collected for the FY15 report and then in June for the type of data that will be contained in the SFY17 report.

### **Regional Director Report**

#### **Monthly Report**

Regional Director Beazley presented her monthly report of her activities. She mentioned the tele-dentistry demonstration that will be on March 10th. She also reminded everyone of the Grantee Coordination Meeting scheduled for March 26th in Whiteriver.

#### **Financial Reports**

Regional Director Beazley presented the monthly financial reports. She said that on the Expansion strategy, Seven-Mile has moved into Quality First and they have submitted for reimbursement and submitted their data reports which will be reflected on the next reports. She noted that she will be attending the Tele-dentistry demonstration on March 10th. She said that there are no unusual items on the financial reports. She also announced that the Community Resource Guides have arrived. Several deliveries have already been made. Members and public present were given copies of the new Community Resource Guides. Additional copies are available at the Lakeside Regional office.

#### **Future Agenda Items/Council Member Updates**

Chair Endfield asked for any future agenda items and Council member updates however no members responded.

#### **Adjourn**

Chair Endfield reminded everyone the next meeting is on April 6, 2015 at 3:00pm ABC Day Care Center, 422 South 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue, Whiteriver, Arizona 85941. She adjourned the meeting at 3:25.

## REACH OUT & READ

## ORAL HEALTH

For this quarter, the Navajo County Public Health Service Department participated in two different events that had huge attendance from the community. The first event was the Cibecue Child Find Oktoberfest, where they provided information to 119 adults, 27 kids and 146 dental kits were distributed. The second event was the Whiteriver Child Find Christmas Festival, they had the opportunity to provide information to 169 adults, 63 juniors, and 71 children under the age of 5 years olds and distributed 303 dental kits.

## FAMILY SUPPORT – CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Success story: Spoke with toddler's father who shared - the information that was discussed and left at the last visit helped the parents to change their strategy on the toddler's toilet training. The toddler's dad said that at first he was a little uncomfortable taking his son to the bathroom when he (the dad) had to go to the bathroom. He said that when he did this that his son picked up on how to go to the potty in a few weeks. The toddler no longer wants to use the potty chair but rather use 'daddy's' toilet.

## EXPANSION, START-UP AND/OR CAPITAL EXPENSE

In quarter 2 of SFY15, the grantee has been conducting outreach activities by organizing radio advertisement through the radio station and providing flyers to the local agencies and daycare facilities about the new Pre-K program. Through this effort, the grantee continues to increase attendance with parents enrolling their students through the school year.

Starting in quarter 3 of SFY15 the grantee will be transitioning into the Quality First Program and is excited about the coaching component the program will be receiving.

## PARENT OUTREACH AND AWARENESS

For quarter 2 of SFY15, the grantee has expanded collaboration efforts in the region. They have had great success working with the ABC Learning Center. The director has been extremely receptive and supportive of the program, and is posting flyers, offering space and connecting with High School students with children and encouraging them to attend the workshops.

The challenge that the grantee has shared in implementing the strategy is low attendance at the workshops. It has been suggested that the workshops should be held in the evening so more parents can attend. The grantee is scheduling workshops in the early evening, which will hopefully lead to greater attendance.
