Dear Chairman Lynn:

The Pinal Regional Partnership Council is requesting the State Board consider the proposed amendment to the current Pinal 2013 Oral Health contract with Sun Life Family Health Center (FTF-RC019-12-0331-01-Y2). On August 14, 2012 the Pinal Regional Partnership approved a contract amendment to allow for the additional \$150,000 to be added to the current amount of \$300,000. These funds will allow for the final purchase of the mobile dental unit. The Mobile Unit was anticipated to be received within the 2011-2012 year, but due to delays within the construction process, the mobile unit was not received until August 15, 2012. This amendment to the grant agreement is consistent with the \$150,000 increase in the allotment for this strategy approved by the Board at the August meeting.

The Pinal Regional Council is respectfully requesting the Board to approve this request to increase the Sun Life Family Health Center (FTF-RC019-12-0331-01-Y2) SFY2013 contract from \$300,000 to \$450,000.

The San Carlos Apache Regional Partnership Council is presenting a Tribal Grant Agreement with the San Carlos Apache Tribe for consideration of approval for SFY2013. At their meeting on August 29, 2012 the San Carlos Apache Regional Partnership Council recommended the award of the following Tribal Grant Agreement to the San Carlos Apache Tribe:

1.) Curriculum Development-Parent Education to be implemented by the San Carlos Apache Tribe Social Services Department in the amount of \$33,550.00 in SFY2013 to develop and submit a culturally relevant, responsive and developmentally appropriate parent education curriculum for the San Carlos Apache families with young children.

The Regional Partnership Council first presented the Curriculum Development-Parent Education strategy as part of the FY2012 funding plan. Since then, the Regional Partnership Council has overcome barriers that delayed the process of implementation. The Regional Partnership Council worked with the San Carlos Apache Tribe Education Committee in the identification of a tribal entity that would be able to implement the strategy in the San Carlos Apache region. The San Carlos Apache Tribe Social Services Department was designated as the tribal entity to implement this strategy. The Regional Partnership Council has had ongoing discussions with the San Carlos Apache Tribe's Education Committee and the identified tribal entity to determine the best plan of action in implementing this strategy in a way that would best meet the needs of the children and families in the San Carlos Apache region.

The Gila Regional Partnership Council is pleased to present to the First Things First Board a Government to Government Agreement for Care Coordination – Healthy Steps and Developmental Screening for consideration of approval for SFY2013. The Gila Regional Partnership Council met, considered and approved this Government to Government agreement with the Gila County Health Department for \$155,000 for October 1, 2012 - June 30, 2013. This award recommendation is in response to the Region's FY13 approved Care Coordination/Medical Home and Developmental and Sensory Screening strategies. The funding for this grant is as follows:

Care Coordination/Medical Home strategy allotment- \$150,000 Developmental Sensory Screening strategy allotment- \$5,000

The program will serve 200 children in Payson and Globe/Miami in the Healthy Steps program. A total of 200 children will also receive Developmental and Social Emotional screening at six month intervals for a total of 400 screenings.

Gila County Healthy Steps Program enhances the relationship between the parents of an infant and their pediatrician, through the child's fifth year. The Healthy Steps Specialist will work with parents to connect them to services in the community, coordinate health care and conduct developmental screenings on a regular basis. The program will also introduce and support early development/literacy activities through the provision of developmentally appropriate information and activities to ensure that parents have the skills that they need to raise healthy children that are ready to succeed. Home visits will be conducted at birth and at key developmental stages to support families to raise healthy successful children.

The program will implement the Ages and Stages On-Line Enterprise Screening including Parent Access to ensure that all children receive timely developmental and social emotional screening. The Gila County Healthy Steps Program will serve

Dear Chairman Lynn:

On behalf of the Navajo/Apache Regional Partnership Council, I would like to request your consideration and approval of the following change to the SFY 2013 Regional Funding Plan, for the learning lab strategy in the amount of \$300,000, approved by the Regional Council on September 12, 2012.

The Regional Partnership Council has approved, and is requesting your consideration and approval of, our amended Learning Lab Strategy. The Navajo County Superintendent of Schools Education Service Agency has conducted an assessment of the feasibility of implementing a Learning Lab in the Navajo/Apache region and has identified several components that will be necessary for successful implementation. Primary partnerships between The Navajo County Education Service Agency, the Northern Arizona Vocational Institutes of Technology (NAVIT), and Northland Pioneer College will be required in order for the Learning Lab to be successful. Strong relationships between these partners are already in place, and will be formalized specifically as they relate to the Learning Lab. Programmatic components that must be part of successful implementation will include full participation in Quality First, working toward a Quality First Rating of 5 Stars, highest quality programming, staff and curriculum that align with both the Arizona Early Learning Standards and the Infant-Toddler Developmental Guidelines. With sufficient funding, the above components are possible and successful implementation of the Learning Lab is feasible.

The Regional Council has reviewed and discussed at length the proposed programmatic elements of the Learning Lab, as well as the proposed draft budgets that provided a basic financial cost analysis of the Learning Lab. The approximate cost of initial start-up of the Learning Lab is \$375,000. A maximum of \$300,000 will be made available by the Navajo/Apache Regional Partnership Council. Matching funds for capital expenditures will be contributed by NAVIT, and additional funds and in-kind support may be contributed by Northland Pioneer College and the Navajo County Superintendent of Schools Education Service Agency. The Regional Council has intentionally leveraged their regional, multi- and statewide funded strategies to compliment and augment the Learning Lab.

The Learning Lab Strategy will be funded at \$300,000 for the remainder of state fiscal year 2013. Beginning in state fiscal year 2014 the funding level will be reduced by 20% for each subsequent year, resulting in funding for SFY 2014 at \$240,000 and \$180,000 for SFY15. It is the intention of the Navajo/Apache Regional Partnership Council to pursue a government to government agreement with the Navajo County Superintendent of Schools Education Service Agency for implementation and start-up of the Learning Lab to begin in January 2013.

The Navajo/Apache Regional Partnership Council believes that the proposed changes to the state fiscal year 2013 Funding Plan will move forward our strategic vision to create a comprehensive early childhood development and health system in the Navajo/Apache Region. Thank you for your consideration.

RE: SFY 2013 Funding Adjustments to Home Visitation and Service Coordination Strategies

Dear Chairman Lynn:

The Yavapai Regional Partnership Council reviewed its SFY 2013 funding allotments to find opportunities to increase service delivery to children and families during 2014 strategic planning. The Council identified strategies where there were un-awarded dollars or anticipated cost savings. As a next step, the Council voted to decrease funding to those line items and move the funds to the carry forward line for SFY2014 planning. The Yavapai Regional Partnership Council respectfully requests approval to decrease SFY 2013 funding in two strategies as follows: 1) a Home Visitation reduction of \$50,000 and 2) a Service Coordination reduction of \$25,000. The total decrease of \$75,000 will then be utilized in SFY 2014 funding plan development to fund vital strategies and those that have demonstrated successful implementation.

The Council seeks to decrease the two strategy allotments due to the following reasons. The Home Visitation grants were awarded at a lower amount, with a realized cost savings of \$50,000. The awarded applicants have a targeted service unit of 214 families, which is a decrease from the originally targeted 328 families. The current Service Coordination strategy allotment of \$50,000 exceeds the anticipated cost of a community assessment. If the unused funds remain in the currently assigned line items, the funds cannot be effectively factored into SFY 2014 planning.

As a result, at the August 29, 2012 Regional Partnership Council meeting, Council members approved shifting the unused funds to carry forward for 2014 planning. The Council now seeks Board approval to transfer the unused funds to the carry forward line for use in 2014 strategic planning. With this transfer, the council can allot funds to strategies that effectively reach children and families and expand or improve service delivery in the Yavapai Region.

In summary, the Yavapai Regional Partnership Council respectfully requests the decrease in funding for the two regional strategies as discussed. We look forward to the ongoing opportunity to provide excellent programs and services to families with children zero to five in the Yavapai Region.

Chairman Lynn:

On behalf of the Central Phoenix Regional Partnership Council, we request your approval of an addition of \$50,000 to our current SFY13 allotment for our Comprehensive Preventative Health Strategy.

Background:

In April, 2012 the Board approved the Council's plan to conduct a Health Impact Assessment (HIA) in SFY12 in for the amount of \$50,000. It was anticipated that the HIA would take place in SFY12, but due to a lack of bidders on the RFQ, the process was delayed until after the close of the fiscal year.

The purpose of the Health Impact Assessment (HIA) to be conducted in the Central Phoenix region is to identify health service gaps, needs and availability of resources within the region specific to injury prevention services, oral health services, nutrition and obesity prevention programs, developmental screening services, and prenatal outreach and resources. The Regional Council will use this analysis to examine current funding of preventive health services and determine how best to approach this work in SFY13 and beyond.

At the August 22, 2012 meeting the Regional Council approved an additional \$50,000 to fund this analysis. The Regional Council requests that the Board consider approval of an increase to the allotment for the Comprehensive Preventative Health Strategy of \$50,000.

The North Phoenix Regional Partnership Council requests your approval to make the following update to the North Phoenix Regional Partnership Council's SFY 2013 Funding Plan. The Regional Partnership Council approved the proposed revision at its August 14, 2012 regular meeting.

 Increase funding to the Quality First Scholarship Strategy from \$3,585,755 to \$4,177,755. The additional funding will be used to make 64 scholarships available for the Teen Parent Support Program at a reimbursement rate of 100% of the Department of Economic Security (DES) median market rate (MMR).

Background:

The North Phoenix Teen Parent Support Program specifically targets pregnant and parenting adolescents, age 19 and younger, providing a continuum of services to educate and support these young families on their road to success. This strategy approach was approved by the Board as part of the original SFY13 Funding Plan.

The goals of the North Phoenix Teen Parent Support Program are: to prevent child abuse and neglect; to assist pregnant and parenting teens in becoming successful parents; to educate young parents on their child's physical, emotional, social, intellectual and language development; to develop support systems in the community; to assist teen parents with enrollment in parenting education classes and enrollment in educational settings that will lead to the completion of a high school diploma or GED; and to help young parents choose quality, safe, environments for child care. In order to assist the teens with the cost of quality child care, the participants are offered child care scholarships which can be used at centers enrolled in Quality First.

For SFY2013, the North Phoenix Council allocated \$3,585,755 for Quality First scholarships for 568 scholarships for children in the region. Prior to this fiscal year, the Council designated that a certain number of Quality First Scholarships be set aside for the teen parent program, and that was the Regional Council's intention this year as well. However, under the new Quality First model the teen parent scholarships were not able to be distributed as part of that package, due to fundamental differences in the two types of scholarships.

Under the new Quality First model, the number of scholarships allotted to each center and the reimbursement rate for the scholarship is determined based on the size and star rating of the center. The scholarship stays with the center and does not follow the child if he/she should no longer attends the center. The teen parent scholarships stay with the child and the teen parent selects the child care provider. This ensures that as the circumstances of the teen parents change (e.g. high school graduation, employment), the child would still have access to affordable, quality child care.

The teen parent scholarship, as intended by our regional council, pays a rate equal to 100% of the DES MMR for the cost of child care. With scholarships in the Quality First model, payment is based on star rating and the majority of centers in the North Phoenix region will be reimbursed at a rate of 75% of the MMR this year. Payment at that rate could result in unaffordable copays for teen parents. The council's intent is for teens to be served in high quality (3-5) star providers. The Council will continue to work with FTF staff on integrating this strategy with the Quality First Scholarship model in a way that maintains child care availability for the target population without establishing a separate reimbursement system for this strategy.

This North Phoenix Teen Parent Support Program Scholarship model is outside of the current QF scholarship package. These are additional scholarships which are distributed and used in addition to those provided to centers based on their QF participation package.

In order to follow through on the intentions in our original funding plan and ensure that there are sufficient scholarship slots available for the Teen Parent Support Program and to lessen the potential impact of copayments with the teen scholarships, the Regional Council requests approval to allot \$592,000 in additional funding for Quality First Scholarships for the Teen Parent Support Program.

The Southwest Maricopa Regional Partnership Council is requesting approval to amend the current government agreement with the Town of Gila Bend to increase funding by \$75,000 for a new contract award of \$240,000 for the Family Resource Center strategy. The Southwest Maricopa Regional Partnership Council voted to approve this proposed amendment at its September 6, 2012 special meeting.

The Town of Gila Bend has partnered with the Southwest Maricopa Regional Council during the previous two years producing great success in servicing families in the Gila Bend area through its Family Resource Center. The proposed amendment would provide additional funds to be dedicated to target Family Resource Center services in the areas of Buckeye, Tonopah and the surrounding communities. The services will include resource and referral, as well as health insurance enrollment assistance which will be provided through a community-based organization. Dear Chairman Lynn:

The Southeast Maricopa Regional Partnership Council is requesting permission from the Arizona Early Childhood Development and Health Board to move forward with the Professional Development portion of our Service Coordination Strategy for which \$25,000 in funding has been allotted by the Southeast Maricopa Regional Partnership Council.

The Southeast Maricopa Regional Partnership Council has a number of effective programs that serve as assets to the region; the challenge, however, is revealed within the 2010 Needs and Assets Report, which illustrates that these services are not coordinated in a manner that results in optimal benefit to the children and families in the region. Too many of the family support, early care and education and health organizations in the region are working in proverbial silos and are unable to provide families with a holistic care approach, by which, at the very minimum, providers are able to connect families to the abundance of resources available. Community awareness of available services is minimal. The 2010 Needs and Assets Report identifies the need to address the aforementioned barrier through facilitated coordination.

It is generally believed that this challenge can be addressed by participating in cross-system efforts. It is the goal of the Southeast Maricopa Regional Council that regional family support, health, and early care and education organizations begin to look at how they can change the way they work together so that services are delivered to children and families in new, more effective and efficient ways. Service agencies that work together are often easier to access and are implemented in a manner that is more responsive to the needs of the families. Cross-system efforts may also result in greater capacity to deliver services because organizations are working together to identify and address gaps in service. By supporting a service coordination effort, the Southeast Maricopa Regional Partnership Council will be instrumental in creating a high quality, interconnected, and comprehensive delivery system that is timely, culturally responsive, family driven, community based, and directed toward enhancing a child's overall development.

The Regional Council is looking to initiate this work with the health care community as it has been shared that health care providers in the region have reported little knowledge of the resources available and how to support families in accessing and referring them to family support and early care and education services. The Regional Council envisions convening health professionals and family support and early care and education providers for a day-long facilitated event. In preparation for an event of this magnitude, the Regional Council plans to convene a subcommittee consisting of Regional Council and community members including current grant partners funded through the care coordination and oral health strategies in November 2012 to further identify the need and how best to approach this work.

The intent of this event is to expand the understanding of services being provided by family support, health and early care and education professionals in the Southeast Maricopa Region and inspire them to coordinate services for families, thereby enhancing overall service provision in the region. A second purpose of the event is to provide learning sessions which provide exposure to health and early care and education information to foster the growth and development of children ages birth to five in the region. All health and early education professionals receive extensive initial training to assure competency in their practice, but information specific to early childhood and health is often limited, as well as the importance of staying up to date on the most recent advances in brain science and early care and education. It is envisioned that the event will include facilitated learning sessions to spotlight specific services and facilitate opportunities that exist for collaboration among family support, early care and education and health professionals and breakout sessions targeting relevant early childhood health and education issues will be offered.

It is anticipated that the \$25,000 will cover expenses such as \$15,000 for project management and content development, \$2,500 for a local keynote speaker, \$1,500 for outreach and print materials and \$6,000 for facility rental. Invitations will target 175 participants of local pediatric clinics, Quality First Centers, oral health providers, school districts, American Academy of Pediatrics members and American Dental Association members within the Southeast Maricopa region.

At this time, the Southeast Maricopa Regional Partnership Council respectfully requests that the Arizona Early Childhood Development and Health Board approve the Regional Partnership Council's petition to move forward in the implementation of the professional development portion of the FY2013 Service Coordination strategy and that the allotment be increased from \$35,000 to \$60,000. The Regional Partnership Council is confident that the proposed changes are in the best interest of children and families in the Southeast Maricopa Region and support the Board approved priorities, aligning with the Early Childhood System that First Things First is working to build.

The Cocopah Regional Partnership Council would like to thank you and the FTF State Board for your continued commitment to the issues of early childhood development and health on the Cocopah Reservation. We would also like to thank you for your support and approval of the Cocopah Regional Partnership Council's strategic Funding Plan for FY2013.

In our funding plan we have allotted funds for the Home Visitation strategy, and those funds have been awarded through the funding mechanism of a Tribal Grant Agreement with the Cocopah Indian Tribe. However, we have realized that the amount of funding is not sufficient to recruit and retain qualified staff to continue to implement this strategy effectively. Therefore, we find it necessary to request the addition of \$10,000 to the FY2013 Home Visitation strategy, and subsequently the FY2013 Grant Agreement with the Cocopah Indian Tribe. If approved, this will allow us to fully support the implementation of a quality program and provide the desperately needed minimum services required for our children and families on the Cocopah Reservation.

 Colorado River Indian Tribes Department of Health Services in the amount of \$15,000.00 to implement a Parent Outreach and Awareness Program in the Colorado River Indian Tribes Region.

The initial funding period is October 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013 with potential renewal of the grant award based on performance and continuation of the strategy by the Regional Council. The potential renewal periods are as follows:

- Renewal period: July 1, 2013 June 30, 2014 (SFY 2014)
- Renewal period: July 1, 2014
 June 30, 2015 (SFY 2015)

This is an existing regional strategy and the Regional Partnership Council recognizes the need to support caregivers of young children by providing quality training and educational experiences. This program will provide four workshops throughout the year. The workshops will include training on child development, prenatal/postnatal brain development, early literacy and preventative strategies, domestic violence and its impact on the family as well as behavioral health issues and substance abuse issues.

The Yuma Regional Partnership Council recommends the following change in the region's Quality First strategy. This change was approved by the Regional Council at their meeting on August 16, 2012.
