AGENDA ITEM: Statewide, Multi-regional and Grants Report

BACKGROUND: The attached table provides information on the statewide strategies, which include those funded, at least partially, by statewide program funds and the multi-regional strategies funded by multiple regions and using a centralized administrative structure. The second column indicates the origin of the funding for each strategy, such as FTF state, FTF regions and federal. Columns 3, 4 and 5 show the FY 2011 budget and financial reimbursements by First Things First as of November 18, 2010, for each strategy. Columns 6 and 7 list the target service number for this fiscal year and the actual service number as of the FY 2011 first quarter report. The final column provides a brief summary of each strategy related to expenditures, activities and accomplishments since the last Board Report. In addition, the last page of the report addresses the three federal grants which First Things First has received – two funded and one for technical assistance.

By the end of FY 2011, most of the 864 participants will have been selected for enrollment. There will always be a small percentage of programs that decline participation or terminate from the program due to varied reasons (closure, etc.) • Hiring is in process for FY 2011 expansion; once completed, personnel costs will rise substantially. • Many Quality First programs are entering their second year of quality improvement. Programs have received initial improvement grants for facility improvements, new materials, equipment, and professional development. Reports have included descriptions of enriched environments, more positive interactions and improved health and safety. • Second year programs are undergoing progress assessments, which are completed 12 – 15 months after the initial assessment year to identify quality achievement and set goals for the second year of quality improvement. During the most recent reporting period, almost 100% of scheduled program assessments were completed within the mandated timelines. • Grantees are collaborating with community partners, including FTF funded programs to better support Quality First programs in accessing available resources and avoid duplication of services.

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							<p>Quality Rating</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Quality First Rating Pilot Study began September 2010. Currently, 52 programs representing 16 regional areas are participating in the Pilot Study. All types of programs are represented – faith-based, private, Head Start, and public schools. The results of the Pilot Study will be used to inform decisions about full implementation of the rating system and to finalize the process for calculating a star rating using the Quality First Point Scale document, Environmental Rating Scales and the Classroom Assessment Scoring System. The Pilot Study is anticipated to end in December 2010. Public forums will be scheduled throughout the state to share results of the Pilot Study once Pilot assessment data is compiled and analyzed.

Reimbursement for scholarships has also been lagging due to continuing negative economic conditions and additional stresses on both programs and staff. Programs have had to lay off staff or reduce their hours and are finding it difficult to pay the sponsoring program portion of the scholarship; therefore, fewer than expected early childhood staff have enrolled in coursework. To address this barrier, financial and administrative waivers have been instituted. T.E.A.C.H. reported a significant increase in the number of outreach activities in the first quarter of FY 2011 with staff participating in 89 community outreach events that provided contact with 1,983 individuals and 7,019 additional contacts by telephone and email to 8,892 providers across the state to inform them of the TEACH program and application process. Informational presentations have been customized to meet the needs of providers by having smaller, pre-scheduled sessions at on-site locations convenient to potential applicants. T.E.A.C.H. is actively recruiting for the spring 2011 semester; scholars are completing their first contract year with the program, resulting in 93 issued bonuses and 72 contracts that have been renewed for an additional year. T.E.A.C.H. continues to develop the Bachelors Degree Pilot Project in collaboration with Boeing, Mesa Community College and ASU. T.E.A.C.H. has identified two of the three candidates for this pilot, who will begin their courses in Spring 2011.

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							<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Waivers for programs that are faced with financial or administrative barriers to their participation, for example -- the human resources policies or contract prohibits payment of a salary differential to staff, or a program is unable to pay the cost of a program component such as the bonus -- have now been re-instated. One primary addition to the waiver process to improve accountability is the requirement must be notarized. All T.E.A.C.H. Program Specialists have been commissioned as public notaries, allowing T.E.A.C.H. Specialists to witness and notarize the waivers documents. The notary process for Tribal programs is still being discussed.

The next set of data will be submitted in SFY 2011 Quarter 2 (January, 2011).</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Updates have been made to the REWARD\$ website and on-line application; these have included adding documents which provide program information and an eligible zip code search function. Future items identified for development include user name and password searches. A paper application, letter templates, and outreach distribution lists have been developed, and a program guide containing policies and process information will be developed for the next fiscal year. VSUW is working with FTF to develop a unit rate that includes administrative costs, as well as an award amount for FY 2012; a unit rate has also been developed for those Regional Councils that meet their target service numbers but do not expend all of their allocated funding (i.e. North Pima during FY 2011 September/October application period).

Two training support groups took place in Yuma over the summer that focused on farming communities. The groups were conducted in Spanish. The grantee continues to find that the traditional 14-week training support model is what most providers prefer, however the home visits model is used based on the needs and requests of stakeholders. The Safety Mobile was used to deliver cribs in the Coconino Region in Tuba City and Yuma and for CPR/First Aid in San Luis. The position in the Coconino Region has been vacated but recruitment efforts are well underway.

Ongoing communication is maintained with the Collaborators via telephone, email and site visits, and a biannual meeting held at Central Arizona College in Coolidge, AZ. The PCPP has recently celebrated its 10th year of operation. The project has been invited to and has attended Regional Partnership Council sponsored grantee meetings, as well as to provide information at the Friend, Family and Neighbors Caregivers Outreach mini-regional conferences. The PCPP is working with the Central Arizona College Marketing Department to further refine a marketing plan for the program. The Grantee collaborates with the United Way of Yuma to assure that Spanish speaking providers have the support to understand and participate in the program in the Yuma and Santa Cruz regions. A few programs have closed or chose not to participate in child care scholarships. Those scholarships have been allotted to other providers. VSUW is collaborating with Child Care Resource & Referral to assure that empty slots are filled if the provider does not have a waiting list. Most providers statewide have a waiting list for the scholarships. Several audits were conducted with providers with no irregularities found.
