Tribal Liaison Quarterly Status Report

October 1, 2010 to December 31, 2010

First Things First (FTF) was created in 2006, when Arizona voters, through the Proposition 203 ballot initiative, decided to set aside 80 cents from each pack of cigarettes sold in order to fund the expansion of education and health programs for children from birth through age five. Under the terms of the proposition, decisions about how to best use the funds are made on a per-region basis by 31 councils made up of local leaders. The statewide board, which has final approval of the councils' recommendations, is responsible for ensuring that the funds are used on programs proven to work at improving outcomes for children. First Things First empowers Arizona's Federally Recognized Tribes to decide how they would like to participate in the regional structure of First Things First. Tribes can choose to have their lands designated as a separate region with a separate Regional Partnership Council, or they can choose to stay within a designated region. Currently there are ten (10) Tribal Regional Partnership Councils and nine (9) Tribes that participate through a geographical region or regions in which their tribal lands are located.

PROJECT RESULTS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

<i>SFY 2012 Check Presentation Events</i>	Throughout October and November, First Things First coordinated Check Presentation events in seven (7) tribal regions. At each event, various FTF Leadership representatives including Board Member Vivian Saunders, Executive Director Rhian Evans Allvin and Tribal Liaison Beverly Russell were on hand to present a symbolic check representative of the SFY 2012 funding allocation for their respective region.	Each Check Presentation event was coordinated with respect to an appropriate venue for each tribal community. For example, some presentations were made during Tribal Council meetings and others were made at community gatherings. As a result of these events, tribal leaders and FTF leadership were able to interact. Additionally, tribal regions were able to increase public awareness of early childhood development and health issues by sharing information with tribal leadership, tribal media and community members about the FTF funded strategies that are currently being implemented in their communities.
<i>Developing Cultural Competency in Early Childhood Development Programming</i>	Throughout the months of October and November First Things First has engaged in a number of activities designed to ensure tribal considerations and cultural competencies in early childhood development and health programming. CURRENT PROJECTS

- Currently, the Tribal Liaison is coordinating an informational exchange meeting between the FTF staff and other state and private partners that provide services to tribes such as ADHS and ITCA. This gathering is scheduled for January 20, 2010.
- An internal electronic bulletin, *Tribal Notes*, has been launched to promote cultural awareness and information about AZ Tribes. This bulletin is generated monthly and is an ongoing project.
- FTF is currently updating the FTF website which will include a redesign of the tribal relations page. Improvements will include updated and organized information on tribal affairs.

<p>Coordination and Collaboration</p>	<p>FTF recognizes that the system goals of FTF can only be achieved through coordination and collaboration with both public and private entities in order to leverage funding, ease families' access to services, and maximize optimal results for young children. In recognition of this concept, First Things First has participated in several information sharing meetings with the following entities this quarter: Arizona Tribal Libraries Association, Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona (ITCA), Zero to Three, and the National American Indian/Alaska Native Head Start Collaboration Office.</p>	<p>As a result of these meetings, First Things First has joined forces with other state agencies and the Arizona Dental Association to participate in the Inaugural AZ Tribal Oral Health Summit planning process. This quarter, FTF has participated in three (3) planning committee meetings for this summit which will take place in April. Additionally, FTF will be facilitating a session during this event to highlight FTF funded oral health strategies in tribal communities. Further, FTF participated in the ITCA Early Childhood Working Group Meeting held on October 28. In December, FTF partnered with Zero to Three to coordinate the very first Infant and Toddler Tribal Roundtable session designed to provide information to AZ Tribal CCDF Directors on the AZ Infant and Toddler Early Learning Standards, Quality First, Professional Development and current FTF funded tribal regional strategies.</p>
